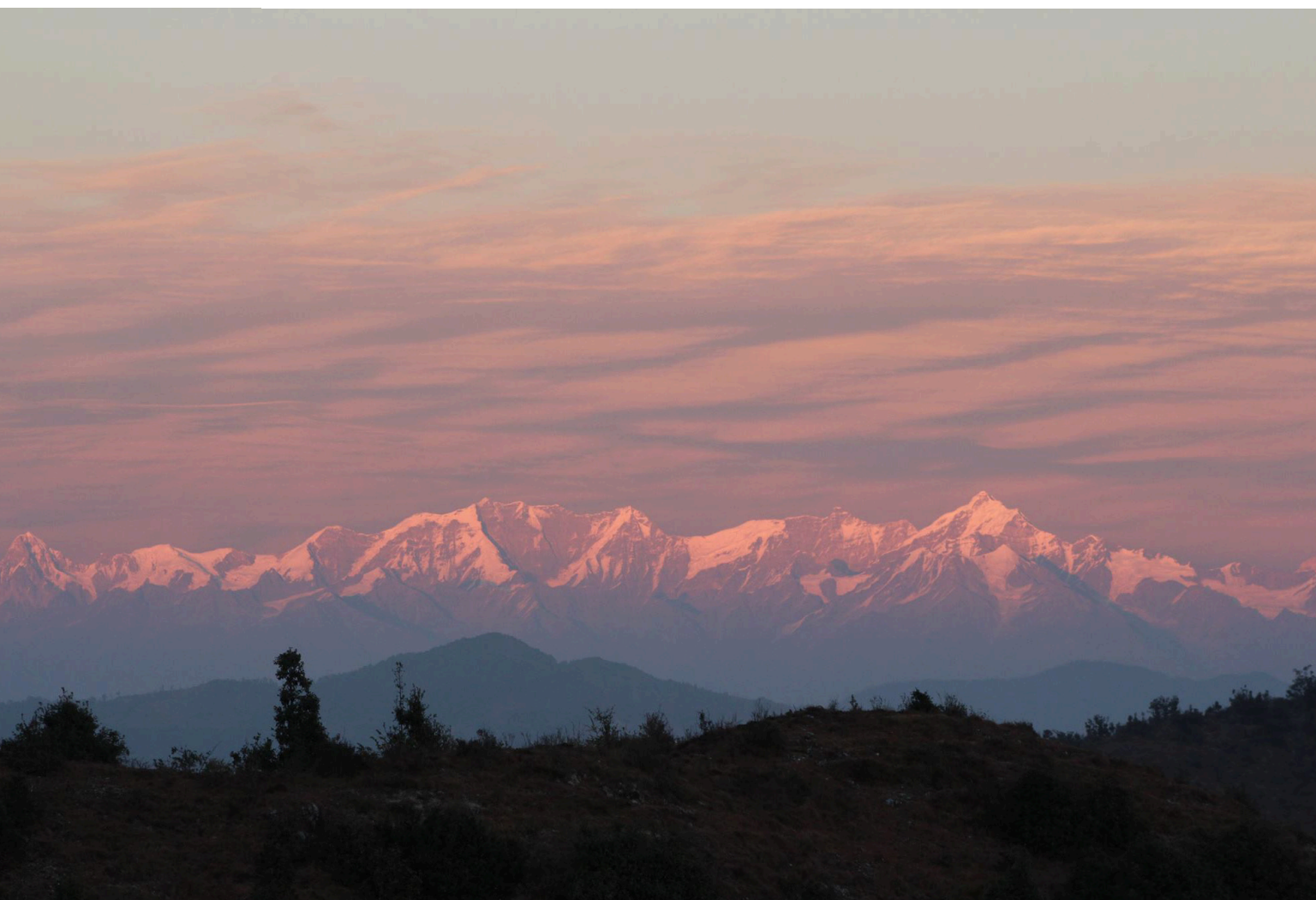
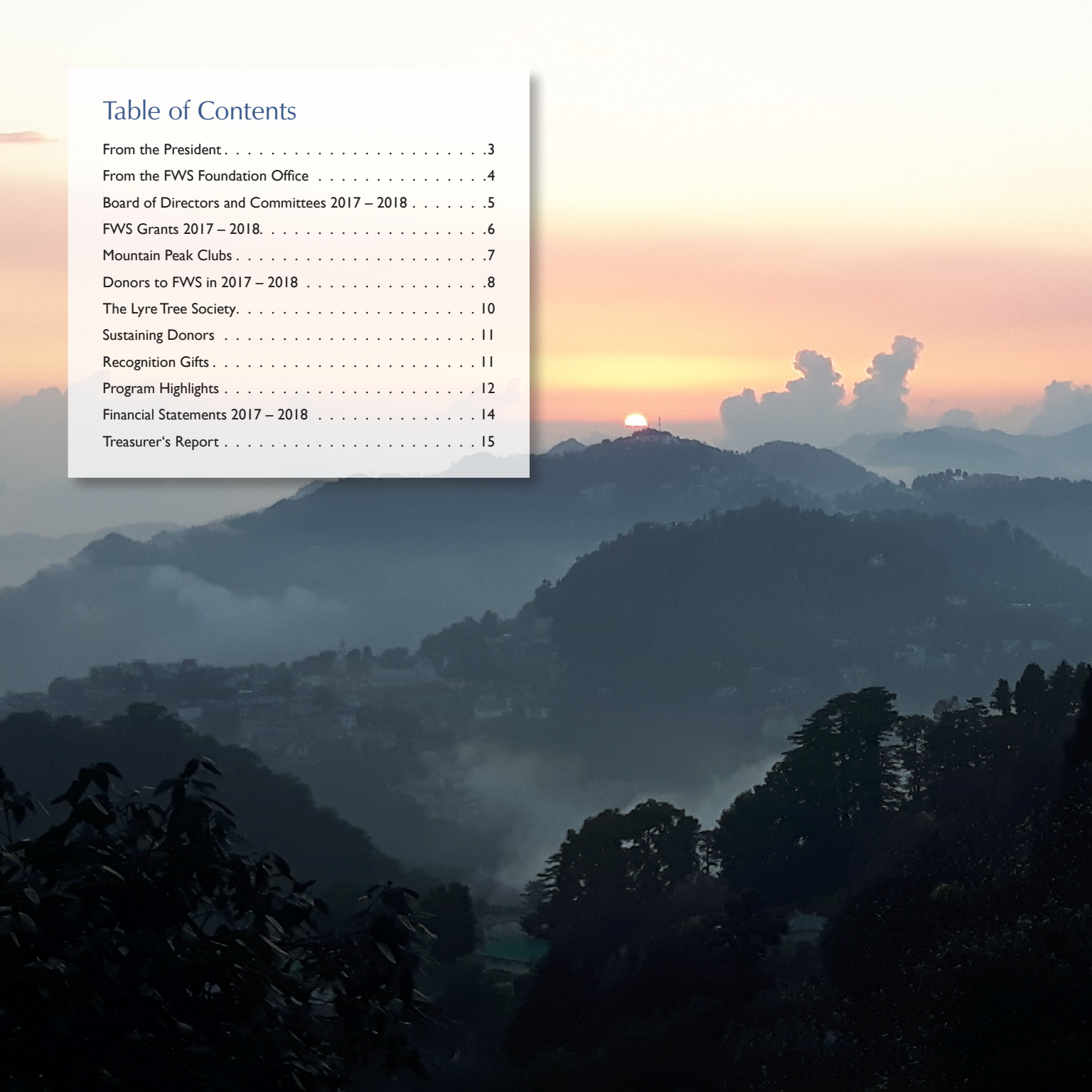

President's Message

Friends of Woodstock School (FWS) and its predecessor entities, KWI and WOSA North America, have been providing assistance to Woodstock through financial, administrative and alumni engagement support for several decades. It is worth reminding ourselves exactly what FWS is and does. FWS is a (501)(c)3 non-profit whose members are Woodstock alumni, staff, parents and friends, and which is run by a board of directors. We manage a pool of financial assets representing a variety of endowment funds, designated funds and unrestricted funds; we make grants that further the mission of FWS; we receive contributions from donors and engage in fundraising in North America; we hold alumni reunions and regional gatherings; and we run an efficient and responsive administrative office that enables FWS to do all of the above. That this organization continues to thrive is due to the commitment of our donors, their enthusiastic support, the dedicated leadership of the FWS Board and committees, and the continuity of our FWS staff in the Mukilteo office.

Woodstock School is now recognized as one of the leading international schools in Asia. Over the past ten years Woodstock has thrived under the leadership of Principal Jonathan Long and an invigorated Board of Directors at Woodstock School. It has a dedicated team of administrators, department heads and teachers and continues to offer an exceptional education to its students. As I have become more and more engaged with both Woodstock School and FWS – both as Treasurer of FWS for six years and now as President – I am proud of the way the school is moving forward and appreciative that we have such a strong and supportive community in North America.

The largest concentration of Woodstock alumni and friends the world over live and work in North America. This may come as a surprise to you, but this community continues to grow. Two-thirds of the students graduating from Woodstock over the past three years chose to attend colleges in the United States and Canada. As a result, we have a growing pool of young Woodstock alumni in North America who will soon – before they know it – be joining our ranks as certified, nostalgic, and generous members of our community.

Thanks to the support and commitment of this community, FWS has been able to provide significant financial assistance to Woodstock over the past decade. During this period we have funded scholarships, teacher training programs, and science, community development, and infrastructure renovation projects that have totaled approximately \$3.5 million.

In the last fiscal year ended June 30, 2018, FWS received \$222,003 in contributions from the North American alumni community and approved grants totaling \$257,269. A breakdown of these grants is provided later in this annual report. We anticipate a very active period of grant support over the next couple of years in six key areas: scholarships, advanced IB certification and professional development for teachers, community engagement, classroom renovation, and funding for the Center for Imagination (Tafton site) and the new Science Facility (Tehri View site). None of these grants would be possible without your interest, commitment and generous support. If you would like to know more about any of these key areas of support, please contact David or Connie Wheeler at our Mukilteo office or reach out to any of the FWS Board members. We would be glad to speak with you about any of these programs and projects.

David and Connie Wheeler and those of us on the FWS Board look forward to catching up with many of you at upcoming regional gatherings, and also at our next FWS Annual Meeting and Reunion, which we are planning to hold in Tampa, Florida in January 2020.

As always the FWS Board thanks you for your past and continuing support, and would like to hear your ideas and suggestions of ways in which you would like to help us grow as an organization. FWS is committed to serving its members and supporting the school's strategic goals so that as Woodstock flourishes it can continue to nourish the next generation of young minds to call the hillside home.

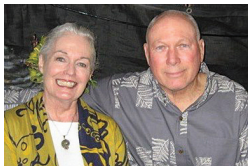

FRIENDS OF WOODSTOCK SCHOOL | GRANTS TO WOODSTOCK

The FWS Board of Directors reviews and approves all grants made from its designated and undesignated funds. Grants made in FY 2017-2018 total \$257,269.

The following Designated Grants were made to enhance programs and facilities at Woodstock School:

Woodstock School Science, Math, and Computer Departments | \$132,380

- I. The FWS Science Fund purchased equipment and teaching aids to strengthen the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) program of Woodstock's Science Department, and helped fund the cost for Woodstock teachers, staff and students to attend educational programs. Funding from the TZ Chu '52 Science Bequest and other donors - \$74,607.
2. And, disbursed \$57,773 (total) from the Science Fund for:
 - a. \$2,784 to the Math Department
 - b. \$26,946 for Professional Development, IB Training for STEM teachers
 - c. \$28,043 for the Design Department

2018 Mussoorie Mountain Festival | \$16,000

This grant was made possible by a generous donation from Suzanne Turner Hanifi '63 and Paul Hanifi. The 2018 Mussoorie Mountain Festival looked at the Culture and Heritage of the Himalaya through the prism of ancient Indian aesthetic philosophy - Navarasa, which means Nine Emotions in which Nava signifies nine and Rasa signifies Emotions. Presentations were organized to portray Navarasa through folklore, life of the intrepid Sherpas, the superhuman effort of mapping the Indian subcontinent, indigenous architecture, conservation efforts in the cold desert town of Leh, traditional drumming from Manipur, traditional medicine, disappearing languages, poetry, Woodstock students' snow camping expedition experiences, the power of roaring Himalayan rivers, arts and crafts, as well as laughter - the best medicine. This festival was programmed in collaboration with Art Conservationist, Anupam Sah and held at Woodstock School in March 2018.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Endowed Scholarships and/or FWS Merit Scholarships | \$108,889

Bishop J. Waskom Pickett Scholarship Endowment | \$12,729

An endowed fund whose net investment income supports students who add to the quality of Woodstock's student body and its social diversity. **Awarded to Lalchhanhimi Bungsut.**

Joseph H. Schoonmaker Scholarship Endowment | \$32,409

An endowed fund whose net investment income is used for children of doctors and/or administrators at Christian legacy hospitals in India and Pakistan. **Awarded to Abigail Gokavi and Visakuo Tsurho.**

Krishan G. Singh Memorial Scholarship Endowment | \$5,534

An endowed fund whose net investment income is used for students, preferably from India, with an interest in its culture and development or in teaching or non-profit work; or from families involved in education; or for students with special learning needs. **Awarded to Nikunj Dalmia.**

Loehlin Family Scholarship Fund | \$5,109

To commemorate and reinforce the traits of leadership and scholarship that was nurtured in members of the Loehlin family at Woodstock School. **Awarded to Tenzin Yigha.**

Elizabeth Webster Shillington Scholarship Fund | \$3,954

An endowed fund whose net investment income is used for deserving applicants needing assistance to attend Woodstock School. **Awarded to Sophia von Hippel.**

The Li-chiang Chu Scholarship Fund | \$27,200

This fund provides supplemental financial support to non-U.S. or non-Canadian students who are graduates of Woodstock School and have successfully completed at least one semester or one quarter of studies at an accredited educational institution. **Awarded to Pranit Garg, Yeonsol Lee, Eriko Shrestha, and Rachel Mulavelil.**

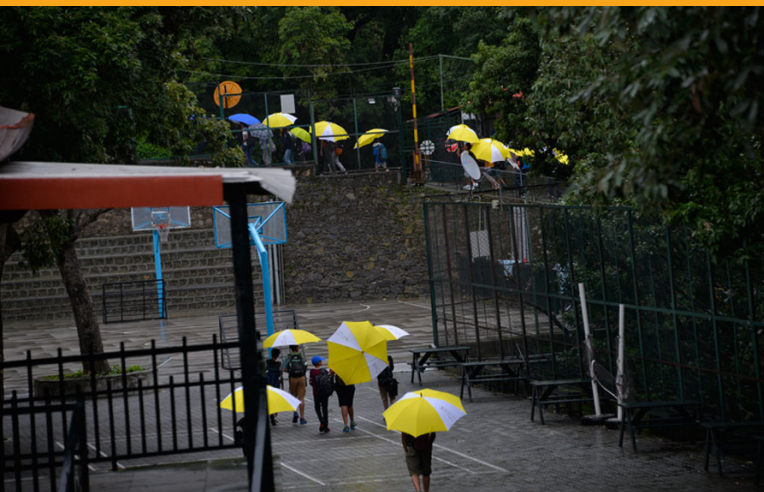

TREASURERS REPORT

2018 was a positive year, with sustained alumni donations, (somewhat overshadowed by last year's Li-chiang Chu donation and TZ Chu donation. Their combined donations represent about 95% of last year's total), increased scholarship and grants, and substantial alumni support. Revenue of \$222,000 from contributions was three times the prior year, once the large donations by Li-chiang Chu and TZ Chu are separated. On Investment returns for the year, mixed. Investment interest and dividends were slightly down \$10,712, but realized gains were up \$55,785 from the prior year. Total Revenue, including financial investments was \$733,457 and administrative, fundraising, and program costs, less grant expense, were about 27% of total Revenue.

Expenses were held level with the prior year at \$199,454. FWS services and management scope followed the prior year. Designated grants, primarily the contributions to the Hanifl Centre's Mussoorie Mountain Festival and science equipment, of \$148,380 increased about \$15,000 from the prior year. Scholarship results are misleading due to timing. The total scholarships awarded, some from endowments, others made in support of the Merit Scholarship program, totaled almost \$110,000, compared with \$64,600 the prior year. Endowments helped to fund six students and the Merit and Sage Program funded an additional three students. The total scholarships awarded reflected the last year of commitment to the Merit and SAGE Scholarship program of \$60,000. The Merit and Sage Scholarship program was modified for next year to help North American students considering Woodstock and was renewed at \$60,000 per year late in 2018.

Our investment funds, net of grants and scholarships, increased from \$5,611,000 to \$5,867,000, a 4.6% gain, net of withdrawals and fees. FWS began using alternative investments to smooth out a volatile stock market, but the results will not be quantifiable for two to three years, as it takes time to diversify FWS's holdings.

In the coming year, the focus will be on completing the Center For Imagination, perhaps the new Science Building at Tehri View, support for teacher training in the transition to an IB curriculum at Woodstock, a renewed community engagement plan, and completion of the Center for Imagination. All very exciting programs that enhance Woodstock, accomplish its mission, and which could not be done without strong alumni support of FWS. Our alumni in North America are just amazing.
